

- Precinct officers are not sure if you are allowed to vote.

If you vote with a provisional ballot:

- You generally will not need to give more information if you showed proof of your identity.
- You will need to give more information if you did not show proof of your identity. You will need to go to the board of elections in person and show them your identification. You must do this no later than 10 days after the election is held.

If you are told you cannot vote for some reason — and you think you should be able to vote — you can ask for a provisional ballot and vote with it.

### **ASSISTANCE AT THE VOTING LOCATION**

If you cannot mark your ballot because of a disability or because you cannot read, you can tell an election official that you need help.

#### **WHO CAN PROVIDE HELP?**

You can ask anyone to help you vote, except for these people:



- Your employer
- An agent of your employer
- An agent of your union
- Any candidate whose name appears on the ballot

You can also get help in marking your ballot from election officials from two different political parties. By law, no one who helps you vote can tell you how to mark your ballot or provide information to others about how you voted. See R.C.3505.24.

### **ACCESSIBILITY LAWS PROTECTING PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES' RIGHT TO VOTE**

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In Ohio, voting locations are required by state and federal law to be accessible for people with disabilities. You must be able to vote in the same way that other voters do.

### **AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT (ADA)**

- Helps make sure that all people with disabilities are treated fairly.
- Makes sure that people with disabilities can:
  - o Apply for the same jobs.
