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Ohio Public Safety Officials:

You put your lives on the line for Ohioans' safety every day.

As public safety professionals, I want to be sure you know your rights under the law to protect your personal information and families, while preserving your right to participate in Ohio elections.

Ohio law provides that peace officers, parole officers, probation officers, bailiffs, prosecuting attorneys, assistant prosecuting attorneys, correctional employees, youth services employees, firefighters, EMTs, or investigators of the Bureau of Criminal Identification and Investigation may redact their home addresses from public databases, including Ohio's online voter rolls.

If one of these is your chosen profession, simply follow the steps in this packet to access and submit your address redaction form.

To Protect Your Voting Address, Simply:

Keep Your Voting Address Current

Please remember that you must be registered to vote at your place of residence. You may not use your business address or a post office box number as your residential address for voting purposes.


Under Ohio law, you may petition to redact your home address from Ohio's online voter rolls if you serve in one of the following professions:

- Peace Officer
- Firefighter
- Emergency Medical Technician
- Prosecuting Attorney or Assistant Prosecuting Attorney
- Correctional Employee
- Parole Officer
- Probation Officer
- Bailiff
- Youth Services Employee
- Investigator With the Bureau of Criminal Identification and Investigation
